The Ireland Venture going home again

Although I was born and grew up in Ireland and have gone back many times to visit, the children have never been. So almost a year ago Rod suggested it was about time I introduced them to Richard, my only remaining sibling, and the rest of the family there. I was one of five so there are lots of cousins, not to mention old school friends with whom I've kept in touch over the years. And so the planning began. Juggling dates around work schedules and a few graduations led us to the last week in June, although getting everyone to commit to a date was like herding cats! Rod and I went a week early to get in shape for the marathon sightseeing and festivities we'd planned.

Kinsale, in West Cork in the south of Ireland, is one of our favorite spots so we had the children, who I might add no longer fit that category, fly into Cork from LAX via Dublin. I met all eight of them there, three children, 1 spouse, and four grown-up grand children. With a soft Irish rain falling, we headed to the house in Kinsale. Right on the water, overlooking a small island in the bay occupied only by some grazing goats, it made a perfect spot for them to unwind from the marathon flight. I let them rest for a couple of hours, enjoying the incredible view of Kinsale Harbor and then it was off to a local pub for an early dinner. Being in a pub really made them feel they had arrived in Ireland. A chat with the locals led to plans extending late into the evening so Rod and I headed home leaving kids to taxi back later.

Kinsale is a lively small town with lots of great pubs and good restaurants, often one and the same. The old narrow streets are filled with interesting little linen and antique shops and the fresh fish cakes made daily at the many fish shops and pastries laden with heavy Irish cream and summer fruits on display at the bakeries, made for tough choices. Kinsale is also among the most historic towns in Ireland. In the 10th century the Vikings established a trading post there. By 1334 it was a thriving port town and in 1666 was

described as "one of the most significant harbours in Europe" trading in wine and salt, among other things. It was the first port of call for shipping from America and Europe. Needing defenses from the powerful Spanish navy, Charles Fort, named after King Charles of England, one of several major fortifications built in the 16th century defended the port from the seaward side and the ivy laden ruins are a nostalgic reminder of the past. The topography of the entrance to the harbor provided the fort with an almost perfect strategic location. Any intruders were sitting ducks, as the Spanish duly discovered in 1601 in the famous Battle of Kinsale when they tried to ally themselves with Ireland against the British and were trounced. Charles Fort was in use until 1922, when Ireland became a Free State. On long summer evenings (sunset is after 10 pm) nestled in the picturesque ruins, there are live summer concerts. What a perfect way to end a day. And right in the center of town the old church founded by St Multose in the 6th century lists all the rectors by name,

But the days were slipping by so after two days we headed to Dublin. I'd planned we'd go by train so we turned in our rental cars and found our seats on the train, each name lit up on a strip above the seats. We enjoyed a leisurely lunch as we watched the landscape of rural Ireland change from the rugged hilly south to the plains of the east and enjoyed all the little train stations with their colorful hanging baskets overflowing with petunias in every imaginable color. And kids still wave at trains! By late afternoon we were in my hometown of Dublin, now a city of almost three million, and battling the traffic to get to our hotel on the north coast of Dublin.
