## **New LMVA Rental Boats Arrive!**

It began as all things do: LMVA's ten rental Expos had aged over time and use, diminishing from a fleet of ten to two. It was time to make a change.

LMVA management, with the support of the Board of Directors, purchased five newly built 14.2 Capri sloops. The order was signed on November 2, 2022 with a promise from Catalina to supply the boats within eight months to one year. They arrived in late March, 2023.

Before describing their construction and journey, it should be noted that all of this was done with the expertise and assistance of LMVYC Jr. Staff Commodore Scott Pursell. The lake looked to our organization for guidance; Scott provided it in droves. Scott is a broker for Massey Yacht

Sales and Service. Massey has been in business for over 35 years. Scott had a history with Catalina Yachts, guiding new buyers of their

larger boats (32 feet and up) in their purchases. Scott had the relationships and experience with Catalina to make this happen.

The boats are brand new; they were built following LMVA's purchase. Catalina closed their Woodland Hills operations, constructing their products in Florida, creating another logistical challenge. The five hulls, their sails, and rigging had to be trucked across the country. While they arrived earlier than promised, it was not without a casu-

alty. One of the hulls was cracked and bowed below the waterline. Catalina has agreed to replace that boat.

LMVA, upon Scott's recommendation, is currently preparing the hull bottoms for longevity. The bottom of each hull will receive three coats of epoxy and two coats of bottom paint. The work is being done, one boat at a time, by Dana Point Shipyard. In fact, work on one of the hulls has already been completed and another is underway.

I almost forgot to describe these five new rentals: They are fixed keel and jib furler rigged. This provides an additional measure of safety for lake members.

The next process is to step the masts and set up the rigging. The lake has asked LMVYC to assist. That is also underway with the first boat to return from the ship-yard. This collaborative effort speaks volumes to the mission and follow through of both LMVA and LMVYC. May these new boats provide many future years of memories to our community.

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A Fleet start

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Editor's Note: This year we are lucky to have articles from two authors who had very different perspectives of this race: S/C Frank Roberts describes his experience on a committee boat at the start line while former LMVYC member Patrick Stege provides a first hand account of racing on a winning boat. # From The Start Line: The 75<sup>th</sup> Newport to Ensenada Race S/C Frank Roberts

After participating in the race last year, I volunteered to help start this year's race. I was assigned to the outside Race Committee boat and received instructions on sighting the line to look for boats starting early. My assigned

boat was the Albert Soiland, named after the founder of the Newport Beach Yacht Club. Dr. Soiland was a pioneer in radi-



ology and founded the American College of Radiology. The boat is used to start races all year long at NBYC.

After training for our roles, we loaded up the boat with our starting equipment, sandwiches, and water. Heading to the start line was a breeze as the CAT powered boat cruised up the coast. After anchoring on the line, we kept

a watchful eye for any boat starting early. After the start, we put up the required flags and

took our position watching the racing yachts jockey for position on the line. The tension built on the starting line as our crew prepared for the start. Pen in hand to record boats as they crossed the line, we kept a watchful eye

for any boat starting early.

After the start, we recorded all of the boats that crossed the line. That was difficult as overlapping sails blocked out numbers. So, several of us called out numbers as we saw them.



This happened over and over as the classes started. After all of the classes were on their way, we pulled up anchor and motored back to the harbor.

I must admit, after working the start line, my sailing blood began to boil a bit as I watched the boats sailing away – wishing I was one of them.

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# Winning Our Freedom: The Race To Ensenada

I raced in the Newport to Ensenada race with Freedom, a Melges 32 based out of Dana Point, skippered by Jon Taylor. Freedom raced in the UL-B fleet, which was comprised of 11 boats, with PHRF ratings ranging between -14 and 6. Freedom had the highest rating in the fleet (slowest boat). I was running the foredeck on Freedom, as well as doing shifts at spinnaker trim throughout the night.

Freedom had a clean start in the middle of the line, giving the bigger boats in the fleet space to maintain clean air. About 20 minutes into the race, Freedom did their first sail change, switching from the jib to a Code 0. This gave them a great angle down the course and they started passing the boats in other fleets with earlier start times.

Freedom carried the code 0 until they were off the coast of Encinitas, where they switched to the A1. As the wind shifted to the West, Freedom was able to get offshore, passing the Coronados about 6 miles outside. As the wind lightened up at night, Freedom was able to maintain boat speed with active trimming and great helm work. All throughout the night, Freedom was doing downwind gybes, often closely crossing their competitor Nereid so closely that even in the dead of night the vessel was visible.

Freedom gained an advantage over Nereid when entering Todos Santos Bay, about 10 miles from Ensenada. Freedom's tactician made the decision to enter the bay as close to shore as possible. This was to cut down on distance sailed, but risked not having wind. The age old adage "you're always an hour away from Ensenada" held true for the last 10 miles of this race. We were going 10 kts

when 10 miles away, 8 kts when 8 miles away, 4 kts when 4 miles away, and it started getting brutal when going 0.5 kts when 0.5 miles away. We were eventually able to drift across the line, taking line honors for the fleet, edging out Nereid by about 5 boat lengths.

With everyone in the fleet owing Freedom time, we secured first place in the UL-B fleet. The winning title came with the honor of jumping into the pool at Casa Del Sol.
