We reached a new milestone in the history of LMVYC last month with a total of 100 memberships. We would love to see more member participation, whether that be on the water or off. Your contribution and/or presence is always appreciated.

The new Capri 14.2's are in the water, at the dock, and rigged for sailing. A big thanks to S/C Frank Roberts, S/C Randy Tiffany, Graham Newman, and Jr. S/C Scott Pursell for your expertise and time in setting up these boats for all to enjoy. If you recently joined the club, like to race sailboats, but don't have one, here is a perfect opportunity to get on the water for some competitive racing!

At the past Lake Association meeting, I proposed a new fleet of remotecontrolled (RC) sailboats called Dragonflite 95's. We would need to comply with all quarantine, insurance, and registration related regulations with some proposed modifications. Feel free to check out one of their websites, <u>https://dragonflite95.us/</u> for more information on the boat. The proposed area for racing would be off the Marketplace dock.

I got into RC sailing during the pandemic at Mason Park Pond in Irvine. I had no prior experience sailing RC boats but was able to pick it up right away. These RC sailboats are just as competitive and exciting as regular sailing. I recently competed in the DF95 Regional 6 Championships in Irvine where we had 30 competitors. If you don't currently own a boat, love to compete, and want a less expensive alternative, an RC sailboat may be right for you. I will keep y'all posted as we move forward with this proposal.

It's hard to believe that we are moving towards the end of the year of regattas with only five regattas left. The 46th Annual Regatta Women at the Helm, will take place on Sunday, August 27, 2023. This should be an exciting regatta for competitors as well as spectators.

My Sailing Journey Nicole Sighiartau

The first time that I ever sailed on the lake was Mother's Day in 2011. My mom, dad, and I took out a Capri 14.2, one of the old lake boats, and we went for a sail. From my memory, it was terrifyingly windy, and I was certain that I would fall in the water. Realistically, it was probably only about 12 knots, but the ex-



perience left me with a decade's worth of fear of capsizing. Soon after, I sailed my sabot for the first time, although I really wouldn't consider it sailing. The majority of my first sabot endeavors were spent stuck in the swim buoys while the lifeguards sped over to help free me. At the time most of my sailing occurred when my dad and I would sail on Wednesday nights in the Capri 14.2s and the once new Expos. I would skipper while my dad crewed, which initially meant I would tack when he told me or would get in trouble for talking, but it didn't take long until I was making my own tactical decisions.



By the time I was seven, I began regularly sailing sabots at Mr. Simenz's practices and started to participate in regattas at Newport Beach. I

loved sabots and ended up spending my summers at Balboa Yacht Club as a member of the Junior Sailing Team while returning to the lake to participate in the club's series. From the ages of eight through twelve I worked my way up through the sabot classes starting at C3 until I finally became an A.

Around this time I decide that it was time to challenge myself with racing a new boat on the lake. Deciding on CFJs, my dad and I began to race together again, but now in B fleet. Neither my dad nor I knew much about sailing FJs, but we made it work until I decided to find new crew. As much as I love sailing with my dad, I wanted to try competing with someone my age. I ended up enlisting my friend Lindsay Taylor. Despite never having sailed before, Lindsey was a quick learner; within a few short months we were successfully racing on the lake. Soon after I began racing FJs on the lake, I also began my short journey of high school sailing. In all honesty, I despised high school sailing. I missed being alone in the boat and the ability to make my own tactical decisions. As a result of Covid, the high school sailing season ended early, and I ended up leaving JSerra Catholic High School permanently. Sadly, it was time for me to start moving out of sabots and into a larger boat; leaving me with the challenging dilemma of what boat to pursue now.

During the summer of 2020, I ended up completing one final season of sabot racing, which resulted in some of my best performances despite being 14. Over the summer, I also tackled my hesitance towards sailing a Balboa 13. After

a bad experience with my dad, which involved incessant bailing, I was unsure whether sailing a Balboa was worth it, but nonetheless, I began practicing in the boat and loved how it was the perfect combination of a sabot and CFJ. I was now able to race in A

fleet, as a result of the boat's speed and agility, without worrying about finding crew. At this point, after experimenting with racing CFJs and 420s in various regattas throughout Southern California and disliking the experience, I truly believed that I was done with sailing double-handed boats, and would continue to casually sail on the lake in my free time.

Little did I know that from September 2021 to July of 2022, I would be racing 420s and CFJs for Balboa Yacht Club. During this span, I had several different crews, but I ended up finishing my double-handed journey with John Sweeny who was also a LMVYC junior sailor, at C420 Nationals. Thankfully, since that regatta, I haven't needed to sail a 420 again. However, during this time span of doublehanded sailing, I also began sailing ILCA 6s, originally called Laser Radials. Over the past year and summer, I have enjoyed learning the technique behind sailing ILCAs, as well as sailing them in several major regattas such as Midwinters West, the US Open in Long Beach, and the Leiter Cup.

I know that I wouldn't have been able to achieve any of my top sailing achievements over the years without the foundation that was built by practicing and racing at Lake Mission Viejo. The coaching I received from Mr. Simenz and my dad helped develop my love for



the sport, as well as the importance of being a polite competitor, although I primarily learned that from Mr. Simenz. I am so grateful for their patience with me when I was afraid of sailing in windy conditions as well as all of their tactical advice. I am also

thankful for everyone else I ever competed against on the lake. Every time I sail, I learn something new from my competitors, whether it's tactical or simply practical sailing knowledge, and it has collectively made me a better sailor.

Overall, sailing has given me so many happy, thrilling, and stressful memories, but I couldn't imagine my life without it. Despite what my parents may tell you, I truly love sailing, and even though I'll be taking a step back from the sport as I attend Hillsdale College in the fall, I'm excited to join their sailing club and experience sailing in the Midwest. Hopefully, I'll see you on the water before I leave for school, but if not, I'll always come back to the lake because there is no place like it. Happy sailing!



Stepping Up: Rigging The Rental Fleet S/C Frank Roberts

With lots of hard work by S/ C Scott Pursell, the lake decided to purchase five new rental sailboats. The boats are the familiar Catalina C14.2k, which means they have a keel under them for stability. The hull is like most other C14.2 boats with a comfortable seating position. The high boom height keeps heads from being hit and the roller furling helps with easy jib deployment.

The boats were sent to Dana Point for a three layer epoxy

bottom coating and one bottom paint coating. This will insure many years of trouble free bottom maintenance. Scott worked long and hard to make the bottom coating a reality. We owe Scott and the lake management a debt of gratitude for getting us first class boats that will last a long time.





The lake asked our Yacht Club to assemble the boats as we have many people with expertise to do so. Scott put together a work crew of himself, me and Graham Newman for the first boat. Assembly included stepping the mast, installing the roller furling, all lines, rudder and tiller assembly and hiking straps. Scott also designed a topping lift to keep the boom up when the sail is lowered for storage. This keeps the cockpit tidy for renters to enter and prevents sails from being stepped on.

Randy Tiffany helped with the next two boats. So we have four in the water and in use. The fifth boat will be rigged shortly as it had to have some repairs due to damage in shipping.

The Team Challenge is just that, teams race different boats in a relay race. This year we had nine skippers so we used three types of boats, the Twitchell, Balboa and the new C14.2K lake rental boats. The new boats are the subject of another article, but this was the first time we could sail them in a regatta. After teams are set and team color assigned, the teams get busy deciding a strategy to put the skipper best suited for the boat. This is usually a self sorting process, but can also be difficult as a team may not have experience in all the boats.

The race starts off with three class boats starting first. The second class starts when their teammate crosses the finish line. The third class starts as the second teammates finish. This sounds easy, but can be quite challenging as the adrenaline surges when its your time to start. Too early or too far behind can allow the races to tighten up if they aren't already.

So after the first race, Team Red with Rod Simenz, Nicole Sighiartau and Adam Vart took the lead with one point, Blue Team with S/C Frank Roberts, S/C and Treasurer Arnold Christensen and Commodore Ross Nemeroff finished second and White Team with Junior S/C Scott Pursell, Port Captain Graham Newman and S/C Emmet Rixford took third.
