

Junior sailing team members were first in one or more classes at 17 regattas and placed in the top three in one or more classes at 22 events. That will be a tough act to follow in 2019, but it will be fun to try, especially with a new goal to get more competitive in CFJs.

Several juniors who have enjoyed great success in smaller single person boats for the past few years are now ready to move up to the higher performance two persons CFJ class used in high school and college racing. That's where the club's Fourth Annual Junior Program Fund Raiser in 2018 comes in, the drive raised over \$1280 for the MVYSF and that helped offset the cost of the newer CFJ purchased last November. Thanks to all those club members that made donations to MVYSF. Thanks also to the Lake management and the Lake Board of Directors that provided funds to purchase a new set of Ullman CFJ racing sails. The yacht club now has two Westerly and two Vanguard CFJs for junior sailor training in preparation for tough competition this year at local regattas, the Summer Junior Olympics and CFJ Class National Championship.

It wasn't always this easy to get our boats to a regatta. In the early days of the junior program about eight years ago we only had to transport a single Sabot to races off the lake. In those days the Sabot went on the roof of Ted Ishikawa's car or Kevin Peyatt's SUV. Jim Talley's



van also was used, as a Sabot fit very nicely inside his van.

The first time our kids went to San Diego YC's famous Dutch Shoe Marathon we needed to transport three Sabots there. So for that event we rented a U Haul 5x10 utility trailer and stacked the boats in it. It worked and we used a U Haul several times, but trying to secure the boats from shifting was always a problem so we looked into getting a proper boat trailer.

Jim Talay knew of a Lido trailer for sale (he once owned it) and the newly formed Mission Viejo Youth Sailing Foundation bought it and donated to the club. Jim then generously had the trailer checked out and put on new tires at his expense. It has served us well, and has at times been used to transport a Laser and a Sabot, a CFJ and a Sabot or two Sabots at a time. As the junior program grew it was obvious we needed more trailer capacity. We looked into modifying the trailer by adding Sabot racks but it turned out the trailer was too short to do that. So we search for a second trailer.

Meanwhile MVYSF bought two newer Sabots for the Club and when transporting them on the existing trailer from Santa Ana back to the lake one flew off the trailer sustaining major damage. That experience made it clear we needed a proper trailer to carry multiple boats and soon!! John Pugh located a used tandem Jet ski trailer and MVYSF acquired it for the club and had it modified to carry four Sabots. With a simple further modification it will be able to carry a Laser on top of the Sabot rack.

The juniors wish to thank all the club members who made contributions to the MVYSF fund drive that made the new trailer possible.
